### **Building Employment Skills at Pathfinders for Autism**

This year, Pathfinders began serving as a **job training site** for individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). While at Pathfinders, **students and adults learn important skills** such as data entry, database management, and office etiquette. Pathfinders works with local experts in vocational training, such as Itineris and the Forbush School, to match tasks with each trainee's **interests and skills**.

# FY2013 by Numbers

- 1,109 clients were personally served through telephone or email inquiries through the Pathfinders for Autism Resource Center.
- 5,127 individuals were reached directly through awareness events such as resource fairs and presentations.
- 860 parents and professionals attended 36 trainings and workshops hosted by Pathfinders. Each workshop featured experts in the field presenting on a variety of relevant topics such as: potty training, advocacy, vocational planning, special diets, the IEP process, and social skills.

### First Responder Trainings Expand

Our newly developed **safety initiatives** took hold this year, with Pathfinders for Autism conducting **autism awareness trainings** for nearly **400 emergency personnel** throughout the State, including counties such as Carroll, Anne Arundel, Worcester, and Queen Anne's. Among those trained were:

- Maryland Capitol Police
- Maryland State Police
- Emergency Medical Services
- Centreville Police Dept.

With autism training now required by the Maryland Police and Corrections Training Commission, our program continues to be in high demand. "We have continued to call on [Pathfinders] for each subsequent Entry Level State Police Academy class ...
